A General Introduction to the Program:

Certificate Course in Spoken English will be of 08 Credits. The minimum period to complete the Program, Certificate Course in Spoken English is - 01 Semester, while the maximum duration allowed to complete it

Scheme of Examination

The Semester Examination shall comprise of the following Components:

1. Mid Semester Examination : 20 Marks 2. Internal Assessment (Oral Examination) : 20 Marks 3. End Semester Examination : 60 marks

Assessment:

I) Internal Assessment:

An Oral examination will be conducted by an Oral Board duly constituted by the Head of the Department, and will be chaired by the Course Coordinator. The distribution of marks for internal assessment shall be as follows:
